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Smoky Valley Ranch

The Nature Conservancy of Kansas hosted a trail dedication and open house May 30th at the Smoky Valley Ranch Preserve with over 60 guests in attendance. Most hiked the 1-mile loop on a warm day on the prairie. The 5-mile loop was hiked also, but by many fewer. Wildflowers were ample with a great show by the Desert Prince's Plume.



I'm still wrestling with interpretive signage that is cow proof. I've learned that any attempt to use traditional trail signs is doomed to failure. To a bovine, any object sticking out of the ground is a rubbing post, especially if it's novel. Trail building in wide-open prairie is very different than other locations where trees, brush, and lots of rocks determine much of the routing. Traffic and/or shading on a high-use trail will maintain the tread, whereas on a grassland with no overhead canopy and only light traffic, there will be no tread without use of herbicide. The greatest aspect of this type of management requires a minimal amount of time, chemicals and labor to produce the desired result.

The funding of this new trail in western Kansas was from an anonymous contribution to the Nature Conservancy. To whomever you are, thanks for a new trail in a beautiful part of the world.

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Trail News

Clinton Lake - North Shore Trails

Wet weather so far this year has made trail maintenance challenging. Trails are clear except for some needed clearing west of mile 7 on the blue trail. A bridge and trail reroute is being planned for a section of the white trail east of Mile 1.

The first two miles of the blue and white trails continue to be used heavily during wet conditions. As a result, there are many sections that will need repair when they dry out this summer and fall. We plan to address some of the wet trail problems by building boardwalks, bridges and other structures this fall. Fall River Lake Trails

Lots of activity at Fall River so far this spring and early summer on the trail project. The entire trail has been sprayed to manage vegetation, Mike Goodwin completing the first three miles plus. The remainder of the trail was sprayed in bits and pieces due to high water levels that closed a road. The lake level was back to normal by the first of June and I completed the spray project by the second weekend. Managing vegetation and growth of

brush over the ten mile trail will be much easier to control with machinery after this the second year of spraying.

Year-to-date we've worked nearly 270 hours on the Badger Creek Project. Our work day on May 15th had a turnout of 15 people who enjoyed the day despite a lengthy hike to the work site due to the high water and road closure. They built some ravine crossings, lopped and cleared brush and opened up around two miles of newly marked trail corridor. We are VERY close to having a completed loop that can be extended to a longer length in the future, crossing the creek with a second loop on the west hillside.

Having completed our 20% matching for the Recreational Trails Grant, we will be making equipment purchases through the second half of this year. I just completed the purchase of an enclosed trailer (see photo) to transport and store equipment and will be working to get it outfitted to secure equipment as it comes in.

KU Field Station

Wilson State Park Trails

This quarter marked the beginning of growing season maintenance, which means vegetation trying to take back the trail from riders. At Wilson, that means mostly grass. But not to be. I applied glyphosate using a 12-18" spray pattern in the center of the 5' wide mowed trail corridor to re-establish the tread we want. About half of that identical tread width sprayed last year had revegetated itself. I used

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a mechanical spraying unit, purchased (at cost) from Simpson Farm Enterprises in Hays. Tony's Aerial Spraying in Great Bend donated the glyphosate. Which reminds me that I need to do a better job of letting trail users know about businesses (and others) that voluntarily support the trail, thus I plan to post something to that effect on our trailhead kiosk. I also should post more about the total volunteer nature and effort of trail building and maintenance. About 25% of the trail is not accessible with an ATV, which requires the use of a backpack sprayer. I use a Stihl, which I have found to be an excellent unit. Stihl is a corporate sponsor of mountain biking.

The area that was burned by KDWP in March (about half of Wilson State Park) looks fantastic, with abundant growth of grasses and spectacular wildflowers. The intent of our prescribed burn was to kill the extremely invasive eastern red cedar, which was rapidly exterminating the native prairie grasses. As expected, the fire was very effective. In terms of trail maintenance, it has reduced the need to either trim or cut trees that were encroaching on the trail corridor. In terms of routing new trail, removal of the dry vegetation revealed the ground surface, making routing of a new trail a much easier task. I routed and flagged about 1 mile of new trail, which along with work over the summer, should be completed in November with a volunteer trail party event.
